

Going to Court in Tennessee Tips for People with Disabilities

State and federal courts must be accessible to people with disabilities. A person with a disability must be able to physically access a courtroom. This may mean moving a court hearing to an accessible room. A court must also provide a person with a disability with any reasonable modifications, auxiliary aids, or services he or she may need to participate in court proceedings.

SOME THINGS YOU CAN ASK FOR

- Ramps;
- Wider doors:
- Door knobs that have long handles instead of round handles;
- A quiet place to wait if you have anxiety;
- A sign language interpreter or FM system if you are deaf or hard of hearing;
- Materials in large print; and/or
- A person (not your lawyer) that may assist with communication between you and the judge.

WHO DO YOU ASK?

- First, contact the **local Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) Coordinator** for your county and ask for his or her help. Find your county's ADA Coordinator online at http://www.tsc.state.tn.us/administration/human-resources/ada-policy/ada-contacts.

GIVE NOTICE

Tell the local ADA Coordinator ahead of time if you need help or need an auxiliary aid. Try to give 5 business days' notice.

THINK ABOUT GIVING PROOF OF YOUR DISABILITY

You do not have to give proof of your disability when you first ask for help. You may have to give proof later if the ADA Coordinator asks you to. You may get help faster if you do go ahead and provide proof when you ask for help. Proof could be a doctor's note that you have a disability and you need a specific reasonable modification because of your disability. Proof could also be a copy of your accessible parking placard.
